Marsh Maneuvers

An educational program of the 4-H Youth Wetlands Program in cooperation with Louisiana Sea Grant



Overview


- A coastal education summer camp program
- For high school youth who have finished the 9th grade through 12th grade.
- Four five-day camps run throughout the month of July.
- 16 youth (8 boys and 8 girls) are selected each week from Louisiana's 64 parishes.



Program Impact

- Over 1,900 youth have participated since 1987.
- Around 10-15 participants per summer indicate they want to pursue a career in an environmental, coastal, or policy-related field
- In 2023, the average increase in scores on the knowledge-based preand post-test was 67%





Daily Agenda

- Each day the youth have a different experiential learning focus
- Includes lecture-style lessons and hands-on activities for the different topics and coastal commodities

Day 1 Shrimp Industry & Introduction to Louisiana's Coast

- Learn about the shrimp life cycle and shrimping industry
- How to catch, clean and cook shrimp
- Introduced to coastal wetlands and the organizations involved in wetlands restoration and management



Day 2 Coastal Restoration, Alligators, & Crabs

- Starts with airboat tour of a marsh
- Shown restoration efforts along the coast of Joseph's Harbor at Rockefeller Wildlife Reserve
- Learn about alligators, conservation efforts, and assist in an alligator egg dissection
- Youth go crabbing and are taught how to catch, clean, cook, and eat blue crabs.





Day 3 Paddle Trip, Menhaden, & Otoliths

- Canoe down Coulee Kinny to observe wildlife and kill the eggs of invasive Apple snails
- Tour Omega Protein Processing Plant to learn how menhaden are harvested, processed, and packaged
- Dissect Speckled trout heads to learn about otoliths and how biologists use them to age fish





Day 4 Marsh Grass Planting, Avery Island, & Oysters

- Harvest Spartina alterniflora (smooth cordgrass) from an area of abundance then replant at in an area that needs protection
- Tour Avery Island and learn the history and geology of the area
- Oyster industry lesson at Shucks Seafood Restaurant





Advanced Marsh Maneuvers

- A three-day camp offered to 16 youth who participated in the summer camp sessions
 - Selected based on active participation, attitude, and pre/post-test results
- Focuses on freshwater marsh ecology and waterfowl habitat management
- Held at White Lake Wetlands Conservation Area during the duck season split in December
