ADDENDUM II QUESTIONS AND RESPONSES

1.	Q.	Enclosure 1, Scope of Services, Section 5.3. "Benchmark Summary Report - Update subsidence estimates with benchmark data from this survey effort". Can you please provide more details on the expectations of this deliverable? Can you provide an example report or a suggested table of contents for this report?
	A.	CPRA has funded multiple regional subsidence studies that inform Coastal Master Plan assumptions. Pertinent reports are cited in the Scope of Services, Section 5.3 with additional detail in Section 6 “References”. The task includes calculating subsidence rates using benchmark elevations generated from this survey effort and comparing those to our current planning values which can be found in CIMS at this link - https://cims.coastal.louisiana.gov/RecordDetail.aspx?Root=0&sid=26794 For this RSIQ, Proposers should present subsidence rates in maps and tables and the discussion should reference the provided subsidence literature.
2.	Q.	Do we need proof that the authorized person has the right to sign?
	A.	No, proof is not required.
3.	Q.	How will hunting season affect our use of an airboat? Will we only be allowed to run at certain times? Can it be towed in by conventional boat to get close to station then use the airboat from there? Any other restrictions we need to be aware of? Regarding hunting season or otherwise.
	A.	Each landowner has their own restrictions during hunting season and for airboat use. Many will not allow airboats during duck season and some have special provisions for alligator and deer seasons. Notes are provided in Appendix C and additional detail will be provided by landowners when the Contracted Party contacts them to request access.
4.	Q.	Does CPRA intend to select/award several consultants to contribute to the project, or one consultant to complete all work?

	A.	CPRA’s preference is to award a contract to one Prime Contractor, however, per Section 1.4 Evaluation and Selection, “Multiple contracts may be awarded to those proposers whose statements, in the opinion of CPRA, best conforms to this solicitation and are most advantageous to the State of Louisiana and CPRA.
